EFFORTS TO REVITALIZE BUSINESS DISTRICT UNDERWAY

East McKeesport Council is committed to taking proactive steps to revitalize our business district. Our business district located on 5th Avenue runs perpendicular to Route 30 and offers a vastly different commercial experience. This commercial space is such a great asset to the community, and with strategic support and planning can become a vibrant business district once again. We envision a walkable commercial corridor that provides shopping and dining experiences for residents as well as those traveling through East McKeesport. Council has engaged Town Center Associates to help East McKeesport with our business district planning and management. Town Center Associates provides comprehensive support to traditional downtown-based, main street communities. We will work together to implement strategic actions to deal with the existing problems in the business district, as well as formulate an action plan that will allow for revitalization and reinvestment. In addition, East McKeesport was selected by Carnegie Mellon University to be a community for their Sustainable Community Development project. Students will be creating a sustainable street design that can be used to conceptualize how sustainable improvements can create a vastly different business environment. As with any project within our community, Council cannot do this alone. We will need support from our residents and business owners to take part in the revitalization of our community. EAST ALLEGHENY HIGH SCHOOL PRESENTS SPRING MUSICAL



Before most people had four wheel drive vehicles, East McKeesport and Wilmerding would close Iceplant Hill (there used to be an iceplant at the bottom) because cars and trucks could not navigate the deep snow! This was a sled riding bonanza! We would make a sled train with our Flexible Flyers by lying on the sled and grabbing the feet of the person lying on the sled in front of us! The train could reach the length of ten sleds! The leader would then zig zag down the street causing the tail end of the train to whip back and forth! The top third of the hill was a normal ride, but the real dare devils would go all the way to Wilmerding! (Of course it was very long pull back up the hill!) The real old timers might actually remember the ice plant itself or how we told the ice truck driver how much ice we needed! We had a card with different numbers on it and the way it was hung in the window indicated the weight of ice that was needed! There were no refrigerators - those were the days of real ice boxes! Another cold thought! There were no snow days on the school calendar because there were no school buses! Everyone walked to school! Remember the snow chains on cars! They are pretty hard to find now! And some the older cars (early 50s type) still had places to put a crank in the engine for cranking by hand in the coldest weather! The cars that are called cross-overs now were called station wagons back then! Another cold weather treat was the multiple buckles on the rubber boots that fit over the leather shoe that almost every kid wore to school! Remember when mom made hot cereal (oats or farina) to send us off to school! One last thought! How about spoonfuls of cod liver oil to supplement our vitamin D in the winter! YUCK!!! Roy Thorpe

IT'S TAX TIME

It's that time of year again. Your 2014 local earned income tax return is due on April 15. Did you know the quickest way to get your refund is to file online? If you live and work in Pennsylvania, you can e-file on our tax administrator's secure website, which available 24/7 at www.KeystoneCollects.com. Keystone Collections Group's e-file is the easy, fast and secure way to file your 2014 tax return. It lets you file your tax return when it is most convenient for you. You will need your W-2, your Social Security Number any other income documents that may apply (such as a PA-UE or a Schedule C). Please note that the forms changed this year. If you will be claiming an out-of-state tax credit or if you work in Philadelphia, you may be eligible for a local earned income tax credit up to the amount you owe to your resident municipality. The worksheet on the back of the form will help you calculate your out-of-state tax credit (attach a copy of your out-of-state filing). If you have questions regarding local tax filing, call Keystone's Taxpayer Helpline at 1-888-328-0565 to speak with a local, knowledgeable Taxpayer Service Agent. You can also email your questions to "Taxpayer Support" at www.KeystoneCollects. com. Taxpayers with earned income in 2014 are required to file a tax return by Wednesday, April 15.
